Hopscotch

Number of Players: One at a time. Equipment: Hopscotch grid, rock, or beanbag.

Use sidewalk chalk and make a hopscotch grid. Number the squares from one to ten. Pick an item that is good for tossing. Start by tossing the item onto Square Hop over the item and hop to the end with a single foot or both feet. Turn around and come back, stopping on Square 2. Balancing on one foot, pick up the item in Square 1 and hop over Square 1 to the start. Continue this pattern with Square 2, and so on. Your turn is over if you toss your rock and miss the correct square.





Red Light, Green Light

Number of Players: A small group. Equipment: None.

One person is the traffic light at one end, and the other players are at the other end. When the traffic light says, "Green light!" The group tries to get as close to the traffic light as possible. When the traffic light says, "Red light!" everyone must freeze; if anyone is spotted moving, they must return to the starting place. The first person to tag the traffic light wins and becomes the next traffic light.

#### Hampton Area Parks


Location: Mill Point Park Address: 100 Eaton St Waterfront green space offering picnic spots, a pavilion & frequent events such as festivals.
